We seem to hit a bit of a lull here in the Fall of 2013 in terms of new apparatus deliveries. In the Metro Fire area, only Somerville has received a new piece since our last update. Somerville took delivery of a new 2013 Pierce Arrow XT 95' MMA for Tower 1. Outside of the Metro area, Gloucester received their new Engine 2, Salem's new Tower Ladder 2 arrived in the City, and Bourne welcomed a new Engine 121. And, way out west, Plainfield, MA placed their new Tanker 2 in service while a little closer to home Princeton acquired a 1998 Pierce Quantum from Virginia.

We tip our cap to our friends at the Box 4 Special Services Association in Worcester as they place their new Rehab Canteen Unit 1 in service. This 2013 Freightliner/Mobile Kitchen Equipment rig will provide much needed relief to fire and emergency scenes throughout Central Massachusetts. Like their colleagues at the Boston Sparks, Rehab 5, and the Providence Canteen, we thank all of these volunteers for their great help to the Fire Service.

Looking toward the end of 2013 (Dreaded Winter) and into 2014, several communities will be receiving new apparatus, starting with Boston who will soon receive 5 new KME Foam pumpers and a new Spartan/EVI Decon Unit. Brookline, Everett, Lynn, Massport, Malden, Medford, Needham, Quincy, Revere, Stoneham, Wakefield, Waltham, and Weymouth also have new apparatus on order with delivery expected in 2014. Plenty to keep us busy as we close one year and start anew in '14!

FIRE TRAINS

Railroaders are a unique breed. To them, there is no such thing as good enough, they look to improve and innovate wherever possible. Get a group of railroaders together for long enough and odds are they will combine their insight and know-how to improve the world around them, to help others. That desire to be helpful along with a knack for practical application is how BNSF's firefighting train came to be. In 2007, Northwest Division GM Doug Jones (currently AVP Safety and Tech Training) challenged his team with creating a unique concept for fighting fires along the BNSF right of way. Employees from mechanical, work equipment and water service pooled their resources to build a specialized railcar capable of extinguishing flames from the track.

"We took a log car and removed the brackets to create a blank canvas," says Ryan Risdon, Mechanical Foreman, Pasco. "Work equipment built upper platforms on both sides of the car and water services outfitted all of the plumbing and fixtures." Based out of Spokane, Wash. the firefighting train is made up of two tender cars, a fire car and a caboose that serves as a command center. The tender cars contain thousands of gallons of water and the fire car is equipped with aqueous fire-fighting foam (AFFF). An on board generator in the caboose provides power for the cars and can also be used to power work lights, radios and other emergency equipment.

We were just putting the final stenciling on when it was called down to California where a wild fire was headed toward a wooden trestle on our right of way," recalls Risdon, himself a volunteer firefighter. "The system is a boon to firefighters because there is no need to run hose. You can spray a huge water stream right from the deck of the car. We can reach about 300 feet up an embankment." The firefighting train is also useful in overhaul service after fires

have been put out "Not only can [it] be used to fight fire directly, or to refill equipment, but we often use it to spray down the right of way to prevent flare ups after the fire has been contained," says Risdon.

BNSF has also placed several water-filled tank cars in strategic positions along the Northwest Division according to a fire protection plan. Each car is equipped with the proper connections so that local fire fighters can refill their equipment or rig hoses directly to the cars to spray water. "[The firefighting train] and our tender cars allow us to get water into spots where fire departments traditionally cannot," says Victor Ahlf, Mechanical Foreman, Spokane. "It's like having a pond on wheels."

The firefighting train has been dispatched to help fight fires in Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Colorado. "Anytime there is a fire within five hours of Spokane we'll usually send [it] out to help," says Ahlf.
